## Kaiser/Woodland Elementary School P.F.O 2023 Scholarship Application

As far as I can remember, I've loved learning about history. It's been my best subject for years and still continues to be. Renisburg reinstated my love for history, but it also inspired an interest in government and politics in the real world. I had never really given our government any thought before then, but it introduced me to the ideals that uphold our society and the social contract between the nation and its citizens.

Since Renisburg, I've become more interested in politics and involved in activities that teach me about government. I joined ASB in middle school after doing student government both at Kaiser and my previous elementary school and while I believe it to be more similar to a business, collaborating with others and voting on certain issues in class is, to me, representative of what a democracy is; more specifically, our democracy. I entered a speech competition in 8th grade in which I wrote a speech on a social issue I was passionate about, won, and was able to present my speech on the steps of the Lincoln Memorial and in Ford's Theater with other students from across the country, who, like me, are interested in helping shape our nation into our dream society. I've been mentored by those who are driven by similar ideas and are currently in public service striving to create a more perfect community.
